Our Mission

Through the collective efforts of community partners, we respond to the evolving needs of children and youth with multiple special needs in Simcoe and York by: providing and enhancing services, championing system change and building capacity.



Double digits. Many of you who have celebrated the birthday of a young person will know that hitting double digits is a milestone. At Children's Treatment Network (CTN), our clients aren't the only ones celebrating double-digit birthdays!

CTN celebrates a decade as an organization this year. When we started out, a shared electronic record wasn't part of the conversation when it came to discussing kids with special needs. Now, it is one of the foundational elements at CTN and key to coordinating service and plans for kids with multiple special needs. The idea of inter-professional practice across sectors was unusual in 2005. These days, we know that working across sectors provides families with care and support where they need it most - their homes, schools and communities. Twitter had just been invented and now it is a communication tool CTN uses frequently to share information and connect with families, service providers, partner organizations and politicians! It was 10 years ago that Facebook opened up membership and allowed anyone to join (prior to that, only students were able to sign up for the social media site). Today, more than 1,400 families use our Facebook page to access information and connect with other parents. Back then, we provided 1,000 children and youth with services; this past year, we proudly served more than 6,000 children and youth.

Though we have a small and mighty corporate team, CTN is actually powered by a network of more than 50 partner organizations (18 with CTN service contracts), more than 200 full and part-time service providers who provide services on our behalf, and, most importantly, the families, children and youth we work with.

The families we collectively serve inspire us to keep going, do more and work better. They encourage us to look at what we're doing well and focus on what we need to improve. Their victories and joys are the reason we push through challenges, and they remind us to take a moment to reflect and celebrate. We see how far they can go in their journeys and we are honoured to play a role.

The accomplishments we share from the past year, over the last 10 years and in the future are shared collectively by all of us.

Looking back and looking forward. That is what our 10th year is all about. We're eager to see how the next 10 years unfold and we're excited to share that with all of you.

New waitlist review process

Waitlists can be one of the biggest challenges in our sector; it's a challenge that we take seriously. CTN worked with our partner organizations to put a new process in place that requires clinical managers to review their waiting lists on a monthly basis. This process ensures that our waiting lists are complete and accurate. It will also help with resource planning, so that children receive services in as timely a manner as possible.

Service Provider Survey results

In the spring, CTN asked service providers to share their feedback about the network via a survey. Here's a snapshot of what they had to share:

- 88% are very satisfied or satisfied with CTN (10% increase over the last survey)
 - 86% indicated that the benefits of being involved with CTN greatly exceed or exceed the drawbacks
 - 71% were very satisfied or satisfied overall with the shared electronic record

Say hi to Thomas-Anthony. He really enjoys superheroes and can tell you anything and everything about them (and the bad guys). In addition to telling us what we're doing well, surveys help identify areas where we need to improve. Based on the feedback we received, we know we need to do some work on several areas, including making the shared electronic record more user-friendly and working to reduce gaps between services and during transitions.

Overhauling our privacy and security policies

At CTN, privacy is crucial. Our partner organizations and families need to have complete confidence that records are secure, private and in compliance with current legislation. Our network structure also adds an element of complexity around privacy. So we knew it was time to overhaul our privacy and security policies and procedures to ensure they were compliant, clear and responsive for today's quickly changing environment. Our new security and privacy polices and procedures provide greater clarity about the responsibilities relating to protecting client information for all staff and partners so our service providers, partner organizations and families can be confident in the fact their information is well taken care of.





STRATEGIC DIRECTION 2

BUILD STRONGER PARTNERSHIPS AND SECURE ADDITIONAL RESOURCES TO REALIZE THE NETWORK'S FULL POTENTIAL

New partnership framework

We worked with our partner organizations to establish a new partnership framework. Designed to clarify roles and responsibilities and highlight what we need to do together to keep our network healthy, the framework helps ensure that partnerships are beneficial for everyone involved. We've included an annual renewal process that guarantees strong, effective communication and categorizes partnerships in a way that makes sense.



CTN and the provincial election: The "Make it Count" campaign

"Make it Count" was CTN's first governmentrelations initiative that encouraged families to get informed and vote in the 2014 provincial election. We got the word out by sharing a newsletter filled with informative tips about the importance of voting and understanding how the major parties were planning to support kids and youth with



special needs. We encouraged families, staff and service providers to attend all-candidate meetings and ask those running in their ridings about their party's plans to support families with special needs. Families shared that they appreciated the help and it allowed them to make more informed decisions. Our partner organizations liked the non-partisan approach and were comfortable promoting and sharing the campaign.

New annualized funding and one-time funding results

We received new funding opportunities from the Ministry of Children and Youth Services that allowed us to provide 467 more kids and youth with services in the following areas.

- Physiotherapy: 88
- Occupational therapy: 164
- Speech-language pathology: 155
- Social work: 20
- Psychology: 40

Special Needs Strategy

This year we announced our participation in Ontario's implementation of a Special Needs Strategy, which is mandated by four ministries: the Ministry of Children and Youth Services, the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care, and the Ministry of Community and Social Services. This strategy will help kids get the services they need at school, home and in the community in a timely, coordinated, effective way. Along with many of our partner organizations, CTN is playing an integral part in the province's strategy – employees co-chaired four tables in Simcoe and York Region.

Focus on building capacity

This past year, CTN's training focus was on expanding, improving and evaluating training plans for families and service providers. We hired a training facilitator to help establish best practices and prioritize training needs.

CTN hosted and co-hosted 57 training events across our 10 local sites with 837 attendees. In addition to these events, 414 participants completed 1,477 courses in the Community Learning Library. The Community Learning Library is an e-learning management system (LMS) that was purchased through the Simcoe Community Integration Leadership project in collaboration with early intervention services in Simcoe County. The LMS provides a strong foundation to continue building a Community Learning Library throughout York and Simcoe and increase knowledge about a variety of topics in a format that is convenient, engaging and accessible.

Family survey results

Last fall, we asked families to tell us about their experience via a survey. The feedback they shared helps us improve programs and services and informs our future efforts. Here is what we heard:

- 88% of families were very satisfied or satisfied with CTN; if families had been involved with the single plan of care process, 90% were very satisfied or satisfied
- 66% of families indicated that their child's participation in school activities is a lot better or better
- 60% of families reported that they are coping a lot better or better as a parent/caregiver



"I know that the professionals working together as a team are helping her to meet goals and are helping the school to define those goals well."

"CTN can't help with her general health and level of disability, but they have provided me with opportunities to find support from other families and they have helped the school to help her meet her goals, which is invaluable."

Going forward, we will continue to pay attention to areas where families tell us they need more support and ensure they are aware of the support available to them through events, online communities and other resources.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION 4

Creation of information technology consortium

The newly developed IT consortium consists of seven organizations across Simcoe and York Region that meet regularly to discuss the various ways that information technology can improve collaboration and integrated care planning. The consortium has established a terms of reference and has been able to share technology implementations within member organizations. Next year our goal is to find a way to increase membership to ensure we are a sustainable group that can continue to work collaboratively.
